


Kim Davies (Director) Board Member since 2018


Coming Soon

Langley Child and Youth Advocacy Centre

Langley service providers have been working quietly behind the scenes for years discussing the possibility of having a Child and Youth Advocacy Centre (CYAC) in Langley.

We received funding from Justice Canada this year to support the initial development of a CYAC in our community. This year, the Project Team met regularly and we have started to work to increase awareness of this project within our community. We have started to more clearly define our service delivery model and have done significant work towards developing formal partner agreements. The team also worked to determine a site for our future CYAC and to build a fundraising partnership to support this project.

Further, another funding proposal was approved for the next 5 years (2023-2028) to complete the development of the Centre, and then to move into a piloting phase and finally to enter into being operational. We believe this is a collaborative community project that will significantly improve the experience of children and youth after a disclosure of abuse, the families who support them, the professionals involved, and result in more favourable outcomes.

BOOST Centre for Kids in Toronto (2019) describes a CYAC as both a place and a process: "As a place, a CYAC is a single location that provides a child-friendly, safe setting for a child to talk about abuse. As a process, the CYAC brings together a multidisciplinary team of professionals involved in child abuse investigation, intervention, and treatment. Professionals work together as a team and share information to achieve the best and most accurate outcomes in child abuse cases."

We offer an environment where parents can engage with their children (ages 0-6) in developmentally appropriate activities, learn about child development, great parenting techniques and services available to them in their community. Highlights of the year:

- The affordability grant we received was super helpful for our program. This allowed us to purchase lots of fresh fruits and veggies for the families to enjoy during snack time. Since covid we had a lot of pre packaged foods and the families were so excited to see fresh foods again.
- We received food donations from the Cloverdale Community Kitchens. Each week we picked up fruits, vegetables, dairy products and various meats. This was a great connection for families as we saw a large increase in food security needs.

Program in the Park

Each week we visited different parks in Langley and Aldergrove every Wednesday throughout the summer. The families participated in different children's activities such as crafts, sports day, scavenger hunts, dinosaur hunt, storybook walks, croquet, parachute games, bubbles and chalk. The families really enjoyed visiting different parks within the Langleys and it gave them the opportunity to visit parks they may not normally have thought to visit and the children loved exploring nature. At the end of summer we had our wrap up BBQ at Williams Park where we had burgers, hot dogs, salads, and dessert. A Face Painter and Magician provided entertainment.

Young Parents Program

This program offers a variety of support services to pregnant and parenting youth age 25 and under.

Outreach Services

Offering support and resources to parents in Aldergrove and Langley looking for information on life skills, finding employment and community resources, attending school, parenting and understanding child development and more. Our outreach staff can meet parents at home or in the community and assist parents in accessing community resources.

Young Parent Support Groups

Outreach staff offer weekly groups for young parents to attend. Different activities and topics of discussion are offered at these groups. We also offer special evening activities and field trips on occasion.

Highlights of the Year:

- Returned to pre-COVID practices. This includes transporting participants to weekly groups, providing transportation to community services during outreach visits and doing home visits.
- Built a partnership with Bez Arts Hub and was able to offer participants a monthly group where participants learned and practiced different dance styles.
- Incorporated starting each weekly group with a land acknowledgement. This has ignited discussions among participants about Indigenous culture and their own Indigenous heritage.

Best Babies of the Langleys

Best Babies offered two weekly lunch clubs in-person for 11 months of this year (May-March); our group sessions were well attended by new mothers craving connection after three long years of pandemic isolation. Our service delivery included a nutritious lunch, vitamins/mineral supplements, bus tickets, food supplementation through grocery gift cards as well as healthy food donations from partners in the community. Our weekly groups included presentations to cover topics related to pregnancy and post-partum up to 1 year, with the addition of speakers to present on specific topics.



Providing one-on-one support to women up to 3 months post-partum, one-on-one outreach support to pregnant women continued to be offered in person, as well as through virtual and phone support. Our outreach workers offered individualized nutrition and lifestyle counselling, breastfeeding preparation and support, monitored maternal and infant health, provided safety information and made appropriate referrals to community resources.

I had a chance to meet some spectacular women, make friends and gain some valuable knowledge." – BB Participant Nobody's Perfect Parenting Program is an educational program designed for parents to learn more about their child's health, safety and behaviour; build on parenting skills; build self-esteem and confidence and build social networks with other parents. The overall goal of the program is to improve parents' understanding, ability and confidence in caring for their children and to facilitate the development of mutual support systems.

This year, we delivered two groups. The first was with Encompass's Pregnant and Parenting Youth program, for both current and former participants. The second group was done in partnership with the Langley School District, and it was offered to newcomer families with children attending Douglas Park Elementary School. The District provided a translator to work with the facilitators to ensure the materials were delivered effectively.

Facilitators work actively with participants to engage them in meaningful conversation, activities and opportunities to draw on the experiences of the group as a whole as parents learn from one another in a safe and supportive environment. Parents leave the program with increased confidence and understanding of their children's health, safety and behaviour as well as improved coping skills and support networks. This voluntary program supports parents with children up to the age of five, from diverse backgrounds.

Early Years Family Navigation

Children & Family Programs and Services

One-On-One Support

The Early Years Family Navigation is a partnership between Encompass and Inclusion Langley. Navigators assist families with young children to connect caregivers with resources and services they are seeking. Information and supports are provided to meet the needs of each family. Navigators can meet in the community, at one of the Early Years Hubs or at the home of a family.

We welcomed participants from eight countries including Colombia, Peru, Bolivia, Mexico, Venezuela, Guatemala, Spain, and the Dominican Republic.

Bright Beginnings Childcare Centre

As of this year, this program is now a Licensed Multi-Age Childcare Centre regulated by Fraser Health Authority. This centre supports young parents 25 and under who want to complete their Grade 12 education or upgrade their courses while they are in class at the Langley Education Centre.

Highlights of the Year:

- We received an affordability grant from the Langley School District and were able to purchase additional snacks to feed the children. This grant made it possible to support families in need and help the parents by providing nutritious snacks for the children.

 Upgrades included safety features and an additional napping space.



United Way School's Out Program An afterschool club for grade 4 and 5 students which runs out of two local elementary schools in Aldergrove– Parkside Centennial Elementary School and Shortreed Elementary School. The club runs 5 days a week for 2 hours after school with 3 sessions per year.

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

Foundry Langley officially opened on July 19, 2022!

Foundry Langley is an integrated health, wellness and social services centre for youth aged 12-24 years and their family members. The five core services offered within this centre are: mental health services, substance use services, primary care (physical and sexual health services), peer support, and social services. Foundry Langley is a collaborative effort with community partners coming together to provide a coordinated community response to support youth in their wellness.


There was a steady increase in visits for the few months after we opened, with the greatest number of unique youth attending programming in March 2023 (111). The average number of unique youth in one month from January to March was 107. While we saw fewer unique youth than anticipated this year, we were not open for an entire year, and have been actively developing and creating awareness of our programming this year. Should these numbers remain consistent, we are on track to exceed our original projections next fiscal year.

Youth Hub Outreach Services

The Langley Youth Hub delivers outreach services to youth in the community, providing access to basic needs, connection to community resources, finding safe housing, and access to substance use supports. Often connecting in areas where youth congregate, the outreach team builds positive connections with youth by engaging in a variety of activities, increasing the overall well-being of youth. Since the addition of the new Youth Hub Outreach van, Youth Hub services have been able to reach the broader community and as we move forward, we look to continue to expand these services and connections with youth.



Youth Hub Outreach Van *New this last fiscal year*

With the introduction of our Youth Hub Outreach van, we are taking a proactive approach to ensure that youth in our community have the support they need. The Youth Hub Outreach van brings our services to neighborhoods, schools, and community hubs where young people gather. By being mobile, we adapt to the changing needs of the youth, ensuring our presence is visible wherever it is needed most. We actively seek partnerships with local schools, non-profits, and other neighbouring agencies to create a collaborative network of support. By working together, we can expand our resources and ideas, maximizing our impact and creating stronger connection for youth in our community.

Youth Programs and Services

Whole Health for Youth Clinic (WHY) Clinic In partnership with the Langley Division of Family Practice, Fraser Health Authority and Langley School District 35. This program connects students in remote areas to a Nurse Practitioner and runs every Friday from October – June, rotating between Brookswood Secondary, D.W. Poppy Secondary, and Aldergrove Community Secondary School.

School Outreach *new this last fiscal year*

During the 2022-2023 school year, our outreach team at the Langley Youth Resource Centre began providing additional outreach support in both middle and high schools in the Langley/Aldergrove areas. While working closely with the Langley School District and school staff, outreach workers connect with students to understand their unique circumstances and offer both guidance and resources to support young people to overcome their challenges. Their proactive approach and engagement with students helps to build meaningful relationships based on trust and understanding. Outreach workers act as a bridge between school and community and provide support and additional referrals when needed. This service is currently offered in 5 high schools, and 4 middle schools, with the demand continuing to grow for these services.

The Youth Street Outreach program offers outreach services to youth throughout Langley who are in need of connection to community resources, at risk of homelessness or those at risk of sexual exploitation.

Youth Housing Placement and Support/ Youth Housing Outreach Support *expanded program this past fiscal year* The Youth Housing Placement and Support Program through Reaching Home offers support to youth who are experiencing any barriers to housing, are at risk of being homeless, or are currently homeless. The outreach worker works with youth aged 12-24 and their support network, which can include family members, school officials, court officials when necessary, peers, and other service providers. Youth, families, schools, community partners, social workers, probation officers, or any other service provider can make referrals to this program.

Long Term Supportive Housing Resource: Fox House

Fox House, settling into its second year in its current form, is a 24/7 staffed, 2-bed supportive home that serves youth aged 12-19. This vital program accommodates youth at all stages of their transition to adulthood, with a priority given to those who identify as part of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community. The environment fosters safety, inclusivity, and support. The staff at Fox House are dedicated to meeting the youth where they are at. They work within a supportive, anti-oppressive, client-centered, and trauma-informed framework. Their primary goal is to empower the youth by assisting them in developing life skills, exploring employment and education opportunities, and more.

Youth Emergency Receiving Homes: Cardinal House and Topham House

Both of our two-bed emergency receiving homes are designed to provide short-term housing for youth ages 12-19 who are referred to us by the Ministry of Family Development. These homes are fully staffed 24/7 and provide client-centred support to youth who require stabilization, assessment, or short-term housing. Staff help support the youth by advocating for them, connecting them to resources, working on goals and/or goal setting, and developing life skills. The Bridges to Employment Program (Bridges) is a Youth Employment and Skills Strategy funded through the Ministry of Employment and Social Development Canada. The objective of this program is to support youth (aged 15 to 30) who experience barriers to employment to navigate the labour market and to successfully transition into employment. Our program aims to support youth to reduce or eliminate their barriers and to learn the skills needed in employment.

The Youth Employment Outreach Support Workers / Facilitators (YEOSW/F), Carly and Steve, provide engaging workshops on a range of topics that will enhance the participants' knowledge of the workplace as well as life skills. Topics include, but are not limited to, resume and cover lettering writing, interview skills, career exploration, professionalism, budgeting, healthy relationships and self-care. Through these in-person workshops and working one-on-one with the YEOSW/Fs, program participants build their confidence and find guidance to explore different career options and to navigate community supports to address their barriers.

The Bridges program could not be as successful as it is without the ongoing support and engagement of community service providers and local employers, who provide informational workshops on various subjects and industries and who provide employment opportunities to the youth from the program. Sexual Abuse Support Services (SASS)

The SASS program provides one-to-one counselling, education and support for children and youth up to the age of 19, who have experienced sexual abuse or assault. Support and education can also be provided for participant's nonoffending family members. We also serve children under the age of 12 who exhibit sexualized behaviour.





The purpose of the Community Happy Fund is to promote the overall well-being (physical, social, emotional, health etc.), of children, youth, families and/or individuals. The fund is supported through an anonymous donor, and referrals come through community partners & Encompass program referrals.

Canadian Tire Jumpstart Charities

Founded in 2005, Jumpstart Charities help kids overcome financial and accessibility barriers to sport and recreation in an effort to provide inclusive play for kids of all abilities. As collaborators, Jumpstart allows Encompass to assist parents/guardians with their application process and help families overcome financial barriers.



Seamus Gee Legacy Project In an effort to keep his memory alive, the SGLP looks into different ways to do so and in a way that would be meaningful to Seamus. The Seamus Gee Legacy Project supports local students to access trades programs, as well as community and school sports programs.
